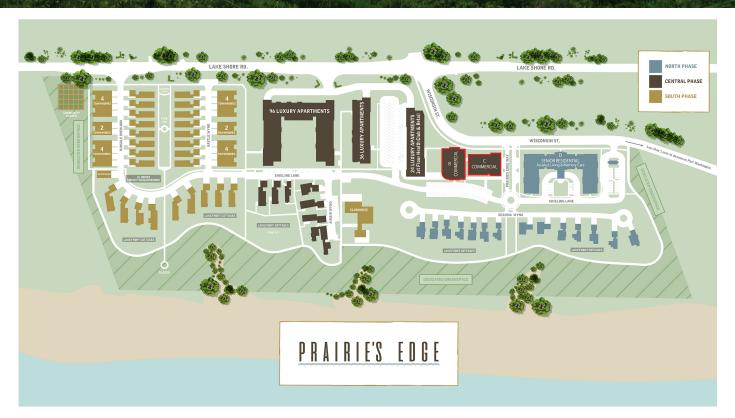

Prairie's Edge sits along the edge of Lake Michigan with more than 2,000 linear feet of lakefront footage on a bluff rising 90 feet providing a serene landscape and unparalleled views of the lake as well as year-round sunsets.

The available commercial spaces at Prairie's Edge are centrally placed within the Prairie's Edge site plan and ideally located along the southern gateway to Port Washington with easy access to main transportation corridors. Approximately 15,000 SF of first floor commercial space, divisible from 1,000-7,500 SF, is available in multiple configurations. Additional outdoor patio space is also available.



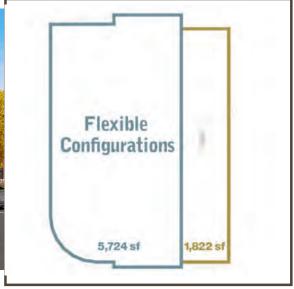

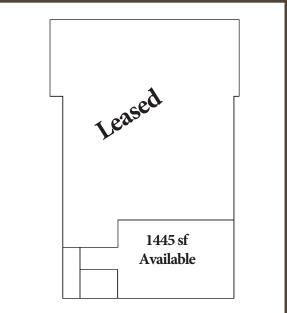

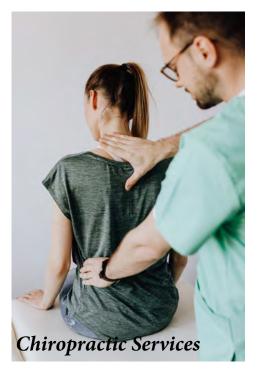

STATE OF WISCONSIN BROKER DISCLOSURE

To Non-Residential Customers

Wisconsin Law requires all real estate licensees to give the following information about brokerage services to prospective customers.

Prior to negotiating on your behalf the Broker must provide you the following disclosure statement:

BROKER DISCLOSURE TO CUSTOMERS

You are the customer of the broker. The broker is either an agent of another party in the transaction or a subagent of another broker who is the agent of another party in the transaction. The broker, or a salesperson acting on the behalf of the broker, may provide brokerage services to you. Whenever the broker is providing brokerage services to you, the broker owes you, the customer the following duties:

- The duty to prove brokerage services to you fairly and honestly.
- The duty to exercise reasonable skill and care in providing brokerage services to you.
- The duty to provide you with accurate information about market conditions within a reasonable time if you request it, unless disclosure of the information is prohibited by law.
- The duty to disclose to you in writing certain material adverse facts about a property, unless disclosure of the information is prohibited by law (see "Definition of Material Adverse Facts" below).
- The duty to protect your confidentiality. Unless the law requires it, the broker will not disclose your confidential information of other parties.
- The duty to safeguard trust funds and other property the broker holds.
- The duty, when negotiating, to present contract proposals in an objective and unbiased manner and disclose the advantages and disadvantages of the proposals.

Please review this information carefully. A broker or salesperson can answer your questions about brokerage services, but if you need legal advice, tax advice, or a professional home inspection, contact an attorney, tax advisor, or home inspector. This disclosure is required by section 452.135 of the Wisconsin Statutes and is for information only. It is a plain language summary of a broker's duties to a customer under section 452.133(1) of the Wisconsin Statutes.

CONFIDENTIALITY NOTICE TO CUSTOMERS

Broker will keep confidential any information given to broker in confidence, or any information obtained by broker that he or she knows a reasonable person would want to be kept confidential by law, or authorize the broker to disclose particular information. A broker shall continue to keep the information confidential after broker is no longer providing brokerage services to you.

The following information is required to be disclosed by law.

- 1. Material adverse facts, as defined in section 452.01(5g) of the Wisconsin statutes (see "definition of material adverse facts" below).
- 2. Any facts known by the broker that contradict any information included in a written inspection report on the property or real estate that is the subject of the transaction. To ensure that the broker is aware of what specific information below. At a later time, you may also provide the broker with other information that you consider to be confidential.

DEFINITION OF MATERIAL ADVERSE FACTS

A "material adverse fact" is defined in Wis. Stat. 452.01 (5g) as an adverse fact that a party indicates is of such significance, or that is generally recognized by a competent licensee as being of such significate to a reasonable party that it affects or would affect the party's decision to enter into a contract or agreement concerning a transaction or affects or would affect the party's decision about the terms of such a contract or agreement. An "adverse fact" is defined in Wis. Stat. 452.01 (le) as a condition or occurrence that a competenet licensee generally recognizes will significantly adversely affect the value of the property, significantly reduce the structural integrity of improvements to real estate, or present a significant health risk to occupants of the property, or information that indicates that a party to a transaction is not able to or does not intend to meet his or her obligations under a contract or agreement made concerning the transaction.
